

# From ROME to HOME

Justin Kadet's International Journey with Chabad

For Justin Kadet, a student at the University of Minnesota's Carlson School of Management, staying connected to his Jewish identity throughout college has been a top priority. Originally from Hopkins, MN, and pursuing a major in Management Information Systems, Justin knew from the beginning that he wanted his Jewish involvement to continue in college. That's what led him to Chabad.

"I've been part of the Jewish community my entire life, and I didn't want that to end when I came to campus," he shares.

Justin's Friday nights at Chabad are a meaningful constant in his busy college life. "I show up for Shabbat at 7 p.m., say hi to Yitzi and Chavi, and sit down with my friends for the meal," he says. "It's a routine that keeps me grounded. What's special about it is that no one's coming because they have to, we're all there because we want to be. That gives it a different kind of energy and connection."

Through his involvement with Chabad, Justin has gained a deeper appreciation for Judaism and the strength of the Jewish community, something that became even more apparent during a recent semester abroad.

Studying in a small town called Pieve Del Grappa in northern Italy through the CIMBA program, Justin found himself far from any established Jewish presence, but that didn't stop him from seeking it out. Near the end of the semester, he and a friend



traveled to Venice and spent the second night of Passover with the Jewish community at Chabad of Venice.

"Walking into the historic Jewish ghetto of Venice was powerful, and I was nervous at first," Justin recalls. "But the community was incredibly welcoming. Even though most people didn't speak English, we connected through shared prayers and the little Hebrew we knew."

The Seder itself was unlike anything he had experienced before. "Each table went at their own pace, so the room was filled with movement, sound, and celebration," he says.

"What struck me most was how familiar it all felt. Even in a place so far from Minneapolis, the traditions were the same. It made me realize just how strong and unifying Jewish practice can be."

Now back on campus, Justin reminds fellow students, especially those new to college or studying abroad, to seek out Jewish life wherever they are. "Chabad is a place where you'll be welcomed, even if you don't know anyone yet," he says. "Yitzi and Chavi will make sure you're introduced and feel at home."

Inside the Caring Partners in Emotional Wellness Program

But sometimes, students need more.

While the University offers counselling services, many of our students have concerns about utilizing those resources, particularly since October 7, as the campus climate has become increasingly hostile toward Jewish students.

That's why we're so grateful for our ongoing partnership with Jewish Family and Children's Services (JFCS) through the Caring Partners in Emotional Wellness (CPIEW) program. This essential initiative ensures that students who need professional mental health care can access it easily, safely, and at no cost to them.



This collaboration between Chabad and JFCS ensures that students can access high-quality therapy that is both culturally sensitive and financially accessible.

Through the program, students are anonymously matched with a JFCS therapist, allowing them to receive support in a way that feels safe, private, and tailored to their needs. In turn, Chabad covers the full cost of therapy beyond what insurance pays, removing a significant barrier to care.

The Caring Partners program provides a crucial alternative. It ensures that students are not left to navigate their struggles alone and that they can receive care from therapists who understand and respect their identity.

We're proud to be part of this ongoing effort to decrease barriers to mental health counselling and ensure that our students are supported in every way. The health and resilience of our students remain at the heart of all we do.



For Bar Soloveychik, a standout Israeli student-athlete, college was more than just a place of academic and athletic growth. It became a pivotal chapter in deepening his Jewish identity and sense of community.

"I found out about Chabad late into my college career," Bar recalls. "I spoke with someone in one of my classes, and they told me about it. After being in the United States for a few years, I was really looking for a sense of community, so I was excited to check it out."

That introduction to Chabad on campus became a turning point. For Bar, it offered a spiritual anchor in the midst of the rigorous demands of student life.

"Chabad helped me remember that there is always a community behind me and that I'll never be alone,"

he says. "It also made me realize that I should be proud to be Jewish."

Among the many events hosted by Chabad, it was the weekly Shabbat dinners that stood out most. "I really liked the Shabbat dinners because they were at the end of the week, it was a good way to unwind and go into the weekend with peace and intention," Bar reflects.

This sense of belonging and identity carried with him far beyond the campus.



"As an Olympic athlete representing Israel on a global stage, Bar found himself navigating not just the pressures of competition, but also the complexities of international politics and anti-Israel sentiment.

"I couldn't be more proud to represent Israel during the war," he shares. "I always felt a sense of achievement by doing so. On the other hand, it was a bit scary, there was a lot of hate toward us. I had moments where other teams from other countries would spit on us."

Despite these painful experiences, Bar considers that time one of the most meaningful of his life. "It was the period when I was most proud to be Jewish and Israeli," he says.

One of the most defining moments came when Bar

reached the Olympic final.

"Representing Israel on that level, with the Israeli flag on my uniform—that was incredibly powerful," he says. "It's something I'll carry with me forever."

Even during the Olympics, Bar remained committed to observing Jewish traditions. "Every Friday, we would do Kiddush," he says, describing a quiet but deeply personal ritual that helped him stay grounded in his faith.

Reflecting on the unique blend of his academic, athletic, and spiritual journeys, Bar shares a message rooted in unity and resilience. "I learned that you always have someone who will support you, as long as you're Jewish."

Bar's journey is a powerful testament to the strength of Jewish identity, the importance of community, and the pride of representing one's heritage to the world.



With antisemitic incidents on college campuses continuing to rise, ensuring the safety of Jewish students has become an urgent priority. At the University of Minnesota, Chabad has responded by launching a major security upgrade to safeguard its building and grounds, and to ensure students feel safe and protected as they engage in Jewish life.

This initiative focuses exclusively on fortifying the Chabad property. Key security enhancements will include a perimeter fence to deter unauthorized access, expanded surveillance coverage, including security cameras at key entry points, as well as other protective measures.



These upgrades are essential because the Chabad building is both a refuge and a symbol of Jewish pride.

Students rely on it as a safe haven, especially during times of unrest and uncertainty.

Strengthening its security is not just about protecting a building; it's about protecting the students, community, and identity it represents.

We are proud to share that the full \$300,000 funding goal for this phase has been met.

A \$150,000 government grant laid the foundation, with additional critical support from a nearly \$25,000 grant from the Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) and almost 60

generous contributions from private donors. This success would not have been possible without the leadership of community member Steve Schachtman, who spearheaded the fundraising effort. Steve's dedication and outreach were pivotal in rallying the community and ensuring this urgent need was met with swift and meaningful action.

Thanks to this outpouring of support, we are now moving into the implementation phase. Plans have been submitted to the city, and we are preparing to begin construction in the coming months.

Our deepest thanks to all who helped make this happen. Their support ensures that Chabad can continue to serve as a safe and welcoming home for Jewish students at the University of Minnesota.


